# AGROMIX launched its white paper "Transforming European Food Systems with Agroforestry"

Brussels, Thursday, 24 October 2024

The <u>document</u> outlined five key co-designed policy recommendations for the EU to maximise the implementation of agroforestry as part of its objective to secure a more sustainable, resilient, and equitable food system that meets the needs of present and future generations.

Five key policy recommendations:

- 1. The classification of agroforestry land should be consistent across the EU, using a common set of criteria underpinned by the available databases.
- 2. Transformative agroforestry should be firmly embedded within a radically reformed CAP and mainstreamed across all relevant EU policies, providing investment along all stages of the agroforestry value chain.
- 3. Robust, long-term financial rewards must be available for the planning, implementation and maintenance of diverse agroforestry systems, as well as for the ecosystem services they provide.
- 4. Tree products and services from agroforestry systems should be firmly embedded within numerous value chains inside and outside of Europe with appropriate and accessible processing facilities that add value for farmers
- 5. Farmers, landowners and relevant decision-makers should be made familiar with 'transformative agroforestry' practices. This can be achieved with initiatives to support training and advisory services.

The recommendations outlined in this white paper build on existing EU regulatory frameworks, notably the CAP, which already provide avenues for the support and promotion of agroforestry practices.

The EU should implement regulations and allocate public funding to promote the widespread adoption of 'transformative agroforestry.' The goal is to ensure that by 2040, more than 20% of the utilised agricultural area is managed using this approach.

The White Paper is endorsed by CIFOR-ICRAF (World Agroforestry), MIXED, EARA (European Alliance for Regenerative Agriculture), Agroecology Coalition, TP Organics, and Agroecology Europe. If you would like to add your name to the list of endorsers, get in touch!!

#### **EU Youth Policy Dialogue**

AEEU is proud to take part with the Youth Network in the first EU Youth Policy Dialogue organised by the European Commission Directorate-General for Agriculture and Rural Development on 11 December in Brussels with Commissioner Christophe Hansen.

Cristina Laurenti and Jesse Donham-Buratti represented the agroecology vision for the generational renewal of agricultural and rural areas. These exchanges will contribute to informing the forthcoming Vision for Agriculture and Food, to be presented in the first 100 days of the new mandate, as well as the strategy for generational renewal in agriculture.

We hope for meaningful discussions on young people's priorities, including:

- the economic viability of the sector,
- the sustainability of the food system,
- and the generational renewal in farming and rural areas...

# **CAP Network Thematic Group on Gen Z: Leading Generational Renewal in Farming**

Coordinator Cristina Laurenti represents AEEU at this Thematic Group that will enable us to assess the necessary changes in both policy and practice to foster greater engagement of young people in agriculture and discuss their role in shaping rural areas.

The CAP 2023-2027 not only facilitates the establishment of young farmers and new entrants, it also supports young entrepreneurs across various economic sectors, enhancing their social inclusion and community engagement. This policy aims to strengthen the socio-economic fabric, making rural areas more attractive for young people to live and work in, thereby investing in rural viability and vitality.

Building on existing groundwork, the TG aims to explore the key characteristics of future farmers from the perspective of young people. This TG will have Generation Z as its main target group, as they are the ones looking towards their future.

#### Side event at the World Food Forum

On 16 October, Agroecology Europe Youth Network attended and co-organized together with Agroecology Coalition and YPARD a side event at the World Food Forum 2024 in Rome, Italy, on the role of youth networks in the agroecological

transition and we couldn't be more energised by the experience.

The innovative ideas, the passion, and the commitment to sustainable agricultural practices shared by the speakers coming from the Global Indigenous Youth Caucus, Agroecology Europe Association Youth Network, YPARD, Young Volunteers Zimbabwe, ProNobis Agroflorestal, and Farm2Food Foundation and ComMutiny - The Youth Collective showed us how young leaders in the field are shaping the future of our planet.

However, it's also important to recognize the issue of "youthwashing"—where young voices are invited to participate, but are not truly empowered or given the space to influence decisions. This can be a challenge when working with larger organizations or stakeholders. It's not enough to just include young people; their insights and solutions must be taken seriously and integrated into actionable outcomes. We must strive for genuine inclusion and collaboration, not just symbolic participation.

#### **Anteprima di Terra Madre**

The Anteprima di Terra Madre gathering in Rome brought together 150 young activists from across Italy, organized by Slow Food Italia with the support of Regione Lazio, Arsial, and other key institutions. The central theme of this event was regeneration, focusing on reshaping the future of food and environmental sustainability through joy and collaboration. Participants, aged 18 to 35, came from diverse backgrounds, united by their shared vision of a more sustainable world.

Members of the Agroecology Europe Youth Network participated in the event. Irene Katsaros, a representative, emphasised the need for a "joyous revolution" as a way to tackle the burdens placed on younger generations. AEEU's objectives were to connect these young voices with agroecological practices and principles, aiming to foster an ecosystem-based approach to food systems that respects natural and human ecosystems alike.

#### **Terra Madre**

President Lili Balogh was invited to the 2024 edition of Terra Madre, the largest international Slow Food event dedicated to celebrate sustainable food and the profound connections between agriculture, the environment, social justice, public health, and the economy. Terra Madre involves delegations from more than 100 countries and features a diverse program of conferences, workshops, taste labs educational activities, and a big market. The event took place from September 26-30, 2024, in Parco Dora, Turin, Italy.

AEEU was represented at the event by president Lili Balogh and Board Members Paola Migliorini and Cristina Laurenti.

It was a great opportunity to reconnect with Healthy Food Healthy Planet, Food Planet Prize, and Slow Food and brainstorm together on strengthening the movement and grassroots initiatives for a healthy, sustainable, and just transformation of agriculture and food systems.

It was also an opportune moment to build bridges across agroecology science, practice, and movement, as president Lili Balogh had the pleasure to meet with Jean Martin Fortier and Basque biointensive market garden growers passionate about growing food with care and social values and with Cesare Paccini president of Associazione Italiana di Agroecologia (AIDA).

#### Using agroecology assessment tools

On 4 December, AEEU hosted an online workshop on agroecology assessment tools! Many indicator systems assess the sustainability of agricultural systems. FAO's <u>Tool for Agroecology Performance Evaluation</u> (**TAPE**) is a comprehensive tool that aims to measure the multi-dimensional performance of agroecological systems at the household/farm level as well as community and territorial scale. Moreover, AEEU developed the <u>Original Agroecological Survey and Indicator System</u> (**OASIS**) as an analytical framework specifically designed to assess where a farm is on the trajectory of transition towards agroecology.


These tools and the collected data can help farmers evaluate their progress in the agroecological transition, guide policymakers and advisors, support researchers and students with statistics, and map the development of agroecological practices.

But how to use these tools on the field? How to select criteria, ask interview questions, make surveys, and store data? How to use the results to foster the transition? Young and experienced agroecology researchers share their first-hand experiences and workshop the practical application of agroecology tools.

#### **Agroecology education**

This Agroecology Europe members meeting on 16 October 2024 discussed agroecology education. Chaired by AEEU Board Member and agroecology professor Paola Migliorini, the session created dialogue between agroecology schools in France and in Italy.

Emilie Rousselou and Valentine de Ganay, from AEEU Member presented practical agroecology education opportunities in France. The largest single-block family estate in the Ile-de-France region, the Domaine de Courances has adopted organic farming, soil conservation, agro-forestry and agro-pastoralism for almost all of its farmland. The estate is used as a practice area by Saltus Campus, the first agroecological high school in France delivering diplomas to young people in agriculture and environmental management. It is also one of the founding farms of EUfarms, the European Network of Certified Organic Farms in Agroecology. Initiated by farmers working with ecosystems, it combines an international network of organic and agro-ecological farms, an action research programme, and peer-to-peer exchanges, to help the new generation of farmers succeed by drawing on the knowledge of the pioneers and giving them visibility.

Andrea Ferrante shared the experiences of Schola Campesina, an international agroecology school, based on the Nyéléni International Forum for Agroecology (2015) and on the principles of 'Dialogo de saberes' and Popular Education. The school aims to cultivate the dialogue among peasant, academical, and activist knowledge. Through knowledge sharing processes (trainings, videos, webinars), they strengthen agroecology worldwide and facilitate the understanding and engagement with the global governance of food and agriculture (Rome process). The overall work of the agroecology school is dedicated to strengthening food producers' organisations worldwide in their struggle for food sovereignty and agroecology.

#### Agroecological transition: from theories to tools

How do we turn words into action to achieve the agroecological transformation of food systems? This lunchtime meeting for AEEU members took place on 24 June to discuss the agroecological transition of food and farming systems. Ruben Savels, Teaching Assistant and Doctoral Researcher at Gent University, talked about the governance aspects of the agroecological transformation and presented transition theories. Andrzej Nowakowski, Advisor on Agriculture and Rural Development for the Greens / EFA Group in the European Parliament, complemented the discussion from a policy perspective, highlighting policy and political tools and approaches to the transition.

# The Original Agroecological Survey and Indicator System (OASIS)







In 2024, AEEU published the Original Agroecological Survey and Indicator System (OASIS) brochure and methodology in **Dutch**, **Italian**, **and Serbian**, in addition to available versions in **English and French**.

OASIS is one of the first analytical frameworks specifically designed to assess where a farm is on the trajectory of transition towards agroecology. OASIS allows the necessary data to be collected in a two-and-a-half-hour interview per farm, which makes national surveys possible. The selected criteria are simple and easily understandable. They look at agricultural activities from the farmer's point of view.

# Joint action against pesticides

EU citizens are calling for pesticidefree, sustainable agriculture. Together with Brussels-based NGOs, we called on Ursula von der Leyen and the European Commission to prioritise a pesticide-free EU in all EU strategies. Europe's health and biodiversity depend on decisive action. Reinstate bold pesticide reduction goals for a healthier Europe!

We need policymakers to integrate agroecology into EU and national policies to make pesticides a thing of the past.

The most comprehensive solution and alternative to pesticides is agroecology. Pesticides are made redundant in agroecological systems where soil biology, biodiversity, and holistic management practices take care of

plant protection. Agroecology is a holistic approach relying on crop diversification and crop rotation to prevent pests and diseases that easily spread across monocultures. Improved agrobiodiversity makes ecosystems more resilient.

# Open Letter for Climate Action and Just Transition in Agriculture

Together with over twenty civil society organisations, we call on Executive Vice-President Ribera Rodríguez and Commissioner Hoekstra to put climate action and a just transition for EU agriculture at the core of their work. If we do not change our food systems, catastrophic climate change and biodiversity collapse will change them for us. A transition is inevitable, but making it just and sustainable requires

action.




# CSO Statement: the EU Commission must provide guarantees on climate, nature, and public health

### **Agroecology for Europe Hub & Map**

Under the Agroecology for Europe (AE4EU) Horizon Project, the Agroecology for Europe Hub was developed as a virtual space to connect all actors interested or involved in agroecology. The Hub's vision is to develop a European network on agroecology. Encouraging networking and knowledge exchange, the Hub enables users to connect digitally with other experts, share insights and best practices on Living Labs, farming practices, funding opportunities, and policy strategies, learn from each other's experiences, and inspire innovation and new ways of working in agroecology.

The map allows users to discover agroecological initiatives in the area and interact with them. The initiatives on the map were part of the mapping effort of AE4EU and are categorised according to the agroecological pillar they represent: science, practice, movement, education, Living Lab.

#### Job opportunity

The newly established group of Agro-Ecological Modeling is looking for a Postdoctoral Researcher. The group is led by Professor Anna Cord, and is based at the University of Bonn, Germany.

This is a full time-time position, with a duration of 3 years (+3, upon positive evaluation). The selected candidate will develop their own research agenda within the framework of our research group, and will teach and mentor students in BSc and MSc programs.

The candidate will use novel technologies for biodiversity monitoring and modeling, particularly passive acoustics. These technologies, combined with AI, will then be used to study habitat selection, occupancy, and species interactions

in agroecosystems. This research will be enabled by several long-term research farms affiliated to, and managed by, the University of Bonn, as by monitoring activities at other sites and locations in Germany and Sweden.
